News from Eta State - Highlights from the Convention

Friday

- Executive Board Meeting, with Eta State NC President Connie Savell presiding, heard reports from select officers and standing committees. (Reports of all committees and personnel were printed in the convention program.) Recommendations were approved for the changes to the Standing Rules. Linda Little and Susan Kuenzel, editors, gave a report on the 2007-2017 History Update book. The merger of Gamma Kappa and Alpha Tau chapters was approved. The 2020 convention to be held in Greensboro on May 1-3 was announced.
- The Opening General Meeting, focusing on chapter and member awards, began with music from the Independence High School Patriot Singers Chamber Choir, led by Beta Tau member Kiki Neale. Eleven members, one per region, received Golden Key Awards. Communications Committee recognized 32 chapters for Newsletter Excellence, 28 for Website Excellence, and 18 for Communications Excellence. Awards Committee announced Chapter Achievement Awards, including 15 Honorable Mention, 21 Distinctive, 19 Excellent, and 12 Superior. President Connie announced the five Presidential Chapter Achievement Awards.
- Our own Beta Delta chapter won the Presidential Achievement Award with a score of 715 points, the highest in the state. We were awarded a crystal vase with our achievement etched on it. We also received the Excellence in Communication award. Both awards will be presented at our May 17 meeting.



Saturday

- The NC DKG Educational Foundation Annual Meeting convened and directors shared highlights of Year 3, including the awarding of five Foundation Literacy/Learning grants and three additional grants supported by the Cranford Endowment. Funds are over \$89,000 and grant awards next year will be available up to \$500 each.
- In the Second General Meeting, attendees heard reports, passed the proposed changes to the Eta State NC Standing Rules, and donated over \$1,600 during the "Passing the House" for Headquarters.
- Breakout sessions included 27 varied opportunities for learning.
- The Banquet Honoring Presidents featured a tribute to chapter presidents and guest speaker and Society Representative Dr. Lyn Babb Schmid, Immediate Past International President, who spoke about DKG Icon Women and the opportunities for leadership provided by DKG. Two scholarship recipients were recognized.



Sunday

- The Ceremony of Remembrance honored 49 sisters with white roses. The Convention Chorus performed.
- The Birthday Brunch, presided over by First Vice-president Dr. Teresa Cowan, included thanks for support of the convention project, the recognition of Rising Star Award honorees, and laughs with the guest speaker Edna Thayer.
- Dr. Sara Massey, Music Representative, showcased her many talents throughout the convention. In addition to directing the convention chorus, she played the piano, flute, and sang.

NC Legislature Begins "Short Session" By: Susan Phipps, Chair, ELP Committee

Wednesday, May 16, marks the opening of the short session at the General Assembly and, as many of you know, a very large crowd of public education supporters will be on hand to welcome lawmakers back to Raleigh on this "Day of Advocacy." A number of DKG members will be in attendance as well to show support and respect for educators and to encourage legislators to increase school funding to address the needs of students and schools.

At the recent Eta State NC Convention Sen. Jeff Tarte encouraged DKG members at the Educational Law & Policy Committee's workshop to go speak to lawmakers at every opportunity and to take many facts about what is happening in our schools and also ideas about what needs to happen. Always tell them the benefits that will be derived from support for strong schools. He reminded members that "we are the experts."

The short session is held to review the 2-year state budget that was developed last year. News reports reveal that the state has taken in 3 to 4 hundred million dollars more than budgeted, so supporters need to request that these funds be used for educational needs.

DKG's Legislative Days are June 6, 13 and 20 when members are encouraged to meet in the front lobby of the legislative building on Jones Street in Raleigh at 9:00 a.m. and then visit their Representatives and Senators. Make appointments ahead of time, share DKG's White Paper (on the DKG website) of school needs, and be sure to wear your pin. See you there!

What's in the new budget

The new budget contains a \$2.6 billion increase for the Department of Education. This increase includes a \$300 million increase for Title I. Also included are increases in funding for students with disabilities, and career and technical education. Additionally \$2.1 billion is allocated for education development, Title 4 block grants, and after school programs. A program which was eliminated is School Recruitment and Support which trains and helps recruit school administrators. Although there was no money for school choice, the funding for charter schools did increase. The STOP School Violence Act (H.R.4909, S.2495) was incorporated into the budget bill, but the Comprehensive School Safety Initiative which was a Department of Justice backed program to research evidence-based issues involved in school safety was discontinued. The law does allow Title IV money to be spent on student safety and mental health issues.

DISMISSAL OF SPECIAL ED COMPLAINTS

As a result of the adoption of new guidelines for disability related complaints at the U.S. Department of Education, all previous complaints have been thrown out. Even though an educator has previously filed a complaint, a new complaint must be filed. As noted in the April 11, 2018 of Education Week: "Marcia Lipett, a special education advocate in Franklin, Mich, estimates during the past two years she has filed more than 2,400 complaints to the Education Department over educational entities that have websites that are inaccessible to those who are blind, or visually impaired or who cannot use a mouse to navigate a website. Her targets have included school systems, universities, library systems, and state departments of education. Last month, Lipsitt began receiving notices that the cases were being dismissed, including complaints that had been filed months ago and were in the process of being investigated. The dismissals were not made on the merits of the cases; she was told that the civil rights office was following a new process established March 5 in a revision of its 'case processing manual.'" This new process should be brought to the attention of anyone who has filed or might need to file a special education complaint. They need to file another complaint if the original complaint was filed prior to March 5, 2018.

REVISED US FORUM OPERATIONAL GUIDELINES AVAILABLE

The newly revised, proposed 2018 United States Forum Operational Guidelines can now be viewed on the US Forum website <u>http://www.usforumdkg.org/operational-guidelines.html</u>. Be sure to look these over carefully as they will be voted on at International this summer.

SHOOTING VIOLENCE PREVENTION

The recently introduced Extreme Risk Protection Order and Violence Prevention Act of 2018 (S.2607, S.2521) was scripted following the shootings in Parkland Florida. Both bills have been referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee. Since both Democrats and Republicans are involved in writing these bills, it is hoped that action to move a combination out of committee and onto the Senate floor for a vote in the near future.

MEDICARE FOR ALL ACT

In this session of Congress the Expanded & Improved Medicare For All Act (S.1804, H.R.676) has been filed in both houses of Congress and was referred to committee in both houses.

FIGHTING ONLINE SEX TRAFFICKING BECOMES LAW

Several bills related to Sex Trafficking were combined and signed into Federal Law number 115-164 on April 11, 2018. This deals with on-line sex trafficking and makes the on line providers more accountable for what is posted on their web sites. It also provides for a fine or 10 years in prison or both. Additionally, it provides an enhanced penalty of a fine and up to 25 years in prison in a case where five or more instances of sex trafficking occur.
