International Literacy Day

Join the International Literacy Day celebration by donating books and reading materials to your local school or community center. Start a reading club, become a mentor of a non-literate person, become a pen pal to a soldier or trucker, or volunteer at your local literacy council.

NATIONAL WOMEN'S HISTORY MUSEUM

Legislation entitled the National Women's History Museum Commission Act of 2013 is currently under consideration in both the House and the Senate (H.R.863, S.398). This act would establish a commission to determine and report on possible locations (which would include whether it should be part of the Smithsonian) and develop a fund raising plan for the museum. Efforts to get either a site for a building or title to an existing building to house the museum have been pursued for over a decade. It is about time for a resolution to be made concerning this problem. Getting action on legislation can be painfully slow. For example, one of our members (Judy Jackson) worked 11 years before getting a bill concerning the age for admission to kindergarten changed via Tennessee legislation. In Mississippi a woman worked for 17 years lobbying the state legislature to establish an institution of higher education for women before she was successful.

Although the Museum does not yet have a physical edifice, it continues to provide information and educational resources for and about women. We were fortunate to have the current CEO of the National Women's History Museum speak to us at the National Legislative Seminar held in Washington, D.C. in 2012. Many of our members have contributed to the museum financially over the years. The museum has numerous resources for teaching at its web site. To learn what is available go to http://www.nwhm.org/education-resources/. The site includes lesson plans on women's suffrage and historical information about women in American history.

VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

Steve Gilmore, Deputy Director of the Wyoming Division of Victim Services spoke at the NW Regional Conference on violence against women and noted that every state has laws on the subject. He introduced attendees to the "Power And Control Wheel" which defines the cycle of physical and mental abuse which is describes the cyclical nature of abuse. Congress recently passed national legislation on this subject which extended past legislation and also expanded those who are protected. The recently passed law still does not cover all places where violence may take place. GOVERNMENT TEACHER RESOURCE

The best single resource for information about national legislation is http://thomas.loc.gov/home/thomas.php which is maintained by the Library of Congress (Named after Thomas Jefferson). In the blue box in the upper left-hand corner of the screen is a list of teacher resources. (This reference is located next to the bottom of the list.) Clicking on this link will give the viewer a list of teacher resources including lesson plans and classroom activities. The site in general offers a place for students to develop their information gathering skills. The teacher could assign a topic on the web site for students to explore. (A hint: If you have difficulty in finding information, use the toll free number (866-327-8670) to contact the office of a senator or representative from your state and ask someone in the office for help.) SCAMS ABOUND

A recent scam which I encountered involved a telephone call informing me that an alert system notifying authorities if I had an emergency was fully paid for and wanting to arrange a time to install the system. I knew I had not paid for such a system and no one else was likely to have done so. The scam is that once the system is in place there is a monthly charge of about \$20. You might want to pass this information along to others who might be taken in by this scam.

Leadership Seminar Highlights!

This year Eta State combined the Leadership Development and Personal Growth Seminars into one Leadership Development Seminar held on June 20—23, 2013 at William Peace University in Raleigh, NC. Entitled "Leadership for All Ages and Stages", the



seminar attracted around 80 participants from across the state, including about 20 beginning teachers (1-3 years experience) who were sponsored by various chapters.

There were three "strands" offered—Leadership, Technology (concentrating on website development and newsletter editing) and Beginning Teachers.

Beta Delta was well represented by Elaine McRae, Diane Howdeshell, Sheila Groves, Ann Pember and Marcia Payne Wooten.

The General Sessions included presentations by Dr. Kathie Harned on "Generational Links", Darcy Grimes on "Teachers Leaders in Global Education" and Dr. Paula Hildebrand, also on "Teachers Leaders in Global Education. Presenters for the "strands" sessions included Dr. Duchess Maye, Dr. Elaine Jenkins, Colleen Lanier, Lynne Leatherwood, Dr. Mary Cauley, Beth Winstead and Sue Roberts.

The evenings were devoted to personal growth activities and included making



beaded bracelets, (see photo) learning the latest line dances, making "homemade" bath salts and foot scrubs, with a quick lesson on aromatherapy.

In addition to the excellent presentations and

classes, the camaraderie was outstanding and the beginning teachers received a special treat. All of the other participants in the seminar brought items that beginning teachers need to survive the first year or two; huge, recyclable shopping bags were filled to the "watch out, you'll hurt your back lifting that" level with packets of copy paper, construction paper, sticky notes, pens, pencils, scissors, glue, tissues, smiley face stickers, erasers, tape and anything else you can imagine that teachers need. HIGHLIGHTS OF THE FINAL EDUCATION BUDGET 2013-2014

Note: The first five topics were identified at the 2012 Eta State convention as focus issues for our group. The issues that follow may be of equal importance to our members.

- **Teacher Tenure** To be phased out for all K-12 teachers in 2018. The state would move to a contract system, with teachers getting one- to four-year contracts, depending on their proficiency. The plan also steps toward merit pay, with \$10.2 million in the second year (2014-15) to give the best teachers bonuses.
- **Teaching Fellows** continues the phase-out of the North Carolina Teaching Fellows program, which annually selected 500 promising high school seniors to receive four-year scholarships allowing them to graduate with little or no college debt in return for working in public schools for four years after graduation.
- **Private School Vouchers** provides \$10 million for the first year and \$50 million in FY2015 for private school vouchers, known as Opportunity Scholarships. Students who meet a defined income threshold and other selected eligibility criteria will be provided up to \$4,200 per year in taxpayer funding to pay for private tuition.
- **Pre-Kindergarten** shifts \$12.4 million from lottery receipts to add 2,500 North Carolina Pre-Kindergarten Program slots. That raises the total available slots to 27,500.
- **School Resource Officers** provides \$7 million in elementary and middle school and \$18.6 million to implement the Excellent Public Schools Act, which includes initiatives aimed to have all students reading at grade level by the end of third grade.

Teacher-to-student ratios – Will be increased to determine total funding allocated for classroom teachers. The Department of Public Instruction estimates this ratio change will result in 5,200 fewer teachers)

Teach for America - spends \$6 million in each of the next two years to expand Teach for America, the national corps of recent college graduates who commit to teaching for two years in public schools after a five-week summer training course.

Teacher Assistants - Funding for teacher assistants will be reduced by \$120 million, or about 21 percent in FY 2014 and 19% in F2015

Master Pay for Teachers – strips the salary boost for teachers with advanced degrees, unless required for the teaching position, beginning in FY2015

Teacher Raises - The budget includes no raises for state employees or teachers, but they will get an extra five days of vacation.

Digital Teaching Tools – State Board of Education to develop a program to instruct teachers and administrators in digital teaching tools

Cursive and Times Tables – Requires students to learn cursive and memorize multiplication tables

Home Schools – definition broadened and parents or guardians no longer have to provide instruction. Parents determining the course of instruction and additional sources of education would meet this definition

Charter Schools – establishes priority and procedures for students applying to charter schools and makes changes to what qualifies as a material revision to a charter application; creates a charter school advisory board; says that only 50% of teachers in a charter school must have a teaching license; requires those teaching math, science, social studies and language arts to be college graduates

Health Education – must now include abortion as a preventable cause of preterm birth in future pregnancies **School Buses** – reduces funding for bus replacement and requires buses to be in use for 20 years or incurred 200,000 miles before qualifying for replacement funding.

Community College/UNC System

Tuition:

University—raise tuition by 12.3 percent next year for out-of-state students attending University of North Carolina campuses in Chapel Hill, Wilmington, Greensboro, and Winston-Salem. Out-of-state tuition would rise 6 percent at other campuses;

Community College - increase community college tuition this year from \$69 to \$71.50 per credit hour for residents, or a maximum of \$80 per year for full-time students.

NC Back-to-Work Program - provide \$4.8 million in one-time money for NC Back-to-Work program, a retraining program for the long-term unemployed in the community college system.

Community College Senior Waiver - eliminate the community college tuition waiver for senior citizens, a \$970,000 annual cost that had allowed residents 65 or older to take some courses free.
